his month, when The Symphonia performs "Wind," the third in its element-themed concerts this season, the person responsible for making it all happen won't be onstage. She'll be behind the scenes, where she's been since the highly regarded chamber orchestra was founded almost 20 years ago.

Annabel Russell became The Symphonia's administrative director in 2004 and its executive director 10 years later. She'd arrived at the Boca Raton-based orchestra with a background that would certainly qualify her as a renaissance woman. Born in England into a Royal Air Force family, she was educated there as well as in Vietnam and Malta. She was a professional ballerina who danced with the Dutch National Ballet. There, she served as a coach who taught Rudolph Nureyev his role, and at the Scottish Theater Ballet, she did the same for Dame Margot Fonteyn.

Russell also studied flamenco in Spain, has crewed on private yachts, managed a yacht club in the Bahamas and is a certified cross-country ski instructor. She has a passion for teaching underserved kids about classical music through The Symphonia's strings program at the Boys & Girls Club of Delray Beach. She has recently guided the orchestra into a partnership with Boca Helping Hands and the Jewish Community Center, offering both groups up to 20 complimentary tickets to Symphonia concerts.

The "Wind" concert of the orchestra's "Inspired, Naturally" season series will be at 3 p.m. Sunday, March 26, at Roberts Theater at Saint Andrew's School in Boca Raton. David Kim, renowned concertmaster of The Philadelphia Orchestra, is principal conductor and violin soloist. He will lead the orchestra in four works, including two by Mozart and the virtuosic Four Seasons of Buenos Aires by Astor Piazzolla. For tickets and more info, please visit thesymphonia.org.
